
2015 Highlights



In 2014 the Colonial Heights Police Department received a grant through DCJS and was able to have a full time School Resource Officer at Tussing Elementary. Officer Jared Brandeberry, a veteran officer, is filling this role. This brings the total number of School Resource Officers to five. There is now a Resource Officer or SRO at every school in Colonial Heights.



Accreditation



For 2015 The Colonial Heights Police Department remained an accredited agency. The Department is up for re-accreditation in 2016. The following paragraph from the VALEPSC website describes what accreditation means to the community:

Accreditation increases the law enforcement agency's ability to prevent and control crime through more effective and efficient delivery of law enforcement services to the community it serves. Accreditation enhances community understanding of the law enforcement agency and its role in the community as well as its goals and objectives. Citizen confidence in the policies and practices of the agency is increased. Accreditation, in conjunction with the philosophy of community policing, commits the agency to a broad range of programs (such as crime prevention) that directly benefit the public. Accreditation creates a forum in which police and citizens work together to control and prevent crime. This partnership will help citizens to understand the challenges that confront law enforcement. Law enforcement will, in turn, receive clear direction from the community about its expectations. Thus, a common set of goals and objectives will be arrived at and implemented.


Department Goals

Colonial Heights Police Department Organizational Chart






Command Staff



Captain W. Keith Early commands the Operations Bureau of the Colonial Heights Police Department. Captain Early has been in Law Enforcement since 1993. He possesses a Bachelor of Science Degree from the Virginia Commonwealth University, and he is a graduate of both the National Criminal Justice Command College and the FBI National Academy. Captain Early oversees Uniform Patrol, Auxiliary Police, Animal Control, and Special Operations



Captain Wayne Newsome is in charge of the Law Enforcement Services Bureau of the Colonial Heights Police Department. Captain Newsome has been in Law Enforcement since 1974. He is a graduate of the National Criminal Justice Command College. Captain Newsome oversees many areas in the department such as Evidence, Records, Investigations, School Resource Officers, Crime Prevention, Accreditation and Internal Affairs.





OPERATIONS

Uniform Patrol

Consisting of thirty-five sworn officers on four squads, these officers provide around the clock police protection through twelve-hour shifts. Uniform Patrol respond to calls for serve, enforce criminal and traffic laws, conduct investigations, process evidence, testify in court and identify and address quality of life issues in the community.

Animal Control

The Animal Control Division enforces all city and state laws and regulations relating to the control and protection of animals. Animal Control also operate and maintain the Animal Control Shelter in accordance with state laws. Animal control consists of one full time Animal Control Officer or ACO, one cross-trained police officer and one part-time Shelter Aide.

Auxiliary Police and Sentinel Officers

The volunteer division of the Colonial Heights Police Department offers citizens the opportunity to promote public safety through personal participation. Auxiliary Police and Sentinel Officers are an invaluable resource to the Department and community as they perform many supplemental police duties.

Special Operations Unit

The Special Operations Unit is a specialty unit comprised of police officers who concentrate on quality-of-life crimes (disorderly conduct, public intoxication, prostitution, etc.), narcotics violations, gang activity, and any other tasks that would require their specialized skill set.

The Special Operations Unit assists the Investigations Division with major crimes as needed. The Unit actively solicits tips from other officers and members of the public regarding suspected criminal activity of an ongoing, chronic nature. These officers work with local, state and federal agencies and are responsible for educating the public regarding topics of narcotics and gangs.



Law Enforcement Services

The primary task of the Law Enforcement Services Bureau is to provide support to all officers and to the command staff of the Colonial Heights Police Department. The Bureau is responsible for the Criminal Investigations Division; training; maintenance and purchasing of equipment, property and evidence and buildings and grounds. The Bureau is also responsible for inspections, research and development, grants, records, receptionists and special projects. The Bureau is also responsible for supplemental department services provided to the schools including three School Resource Officers, and an officer assigned to the D.A.R.E. program.

Investigations

The Investigations Division has the primary responsibility of conducting in-depth criminal and crime scene investigations. In addition to their primary roles, detectives are able to provide guidance to patrol officers concerning criminal investigations and crime scene processing. Detectives investigate many crimes, including narcotics violations, homicides, robberies, sexual crimes, property crimes, frauds, auto thefts, burglaries and missing persons cases. The investigations unit is also responsible for investigating and maintaining compliance on many permits such as Concealed Weapon Permits and Precious Metals Permits.

The Investigations Division consists of a sergeant and three general investigators. The Task Force Detective also falls under the supervision of the Investigations Sergeant.





Law Enforcement Services

DARE / Crime Prevention

The Colonial Heights Police Department has provided a certified D.A.R.E. Officer to the city schools since 1987. Officer Sophie Benkendorf teaches D.A.R.E. to both elementary and middle school students. She also serves as the crime prevention officer, coordinating such events as Celebrate Safe Communities and the Special Olympics Torch Run.

Chaplains

The Police Chaplains are appointed by the Chief of Police to act as an aide to the officers and citizens of Colonial Heights. They strive to provide spiritual guidance, counseling and comfort in times of crisis, without attempting to moralize, evangelize, or criticize.

Crossing Guards

The police department employs five School Crossing Guards. Crossing Guards are responsible for the safe passage of students while entering or exiting school grounds by designated crosswalks.

Records

Two full-time Records Specialists, Ms. Robin Kester and Mrs. Bobbi Adams, are responsible for maintaining all police information. Records Specialists process all police and Animal Control reports, traffic and criminal summonses, parking tickets, alarm citations, vehicle crash reports, property receipts and pawn records. Closed investigative case files are archived and purged as necessary. Each year, our Records Specialists process in excess of 20,000 documents.





School Resources Officers

The department has five school resource officers, one at the High School and one at the Middle School. Their primary mission is to provide a visible and positive image to students. They are able to provide confidential counseling to students and help them make positive choices. School Resource Officers ensure a healthy school environment where both teachers and students feel safe. In the fall of 2014 a fourth school resource officer was added at North Elementary School. These grant funded positions will hopefully lead to School Resource Officers at all three elementary schools.

Specialized Units

There are many specialized units within the department. These units are filled by members of both the Operations and Law Enforcement Services Bureaus. These specializations are credited towards an officer's advancement in the department's Career Development Program.

K-9

Narcotics dogs have been successful in finding a variety of illegal substances which have lead to the arrest and successful conviction of the numerous offenders. Additionally, canines are utilized for drug sweeps of city school buildings and grounds. They are available to assist other local police agencies with searches of schools and the execution of search warrants.



Blitz

In 2015, CHPD added a trailing/tracking K9. She is used to track missing persons and in any other incident which a tracking dog would be useful.

Honor Guard

The Colonial Heights Police Honor Guard consists of police officers who volunteer to represent the department during functions such as parades, official ceremonies, athletic events and funerals for law enforcement officers and other public figures. Honor Guard members wear a distinctive uniform when performing this specialized duty.

Crime Scene Technicians

Crime Scene Technicians are an essential part of the Colonial Heights Police Department. They are trained to assist detectives with major crime scenes as well as investigate minor crimes on their own. Crime Scene Technicians are patrol officers who are trained by the Investigations Division, but assigned to a patrol squad. They are provided with all the tools they need to investigate most crimes scenes they encounter.





Specialized Units

Hostage Negotiators

The Colonial Heights Police Department has several officers who are trained as hostage negotiators. These officers are able to utilize their natural skills, training and experience to verbally communicate with and convince a hostage taker or barricaded subject to release hostages unharmed, and surrender themselves peacefully.

Crash Investigators

These officers are responsible for investigating fatal and major vehicle crashes, as well as crashes involving police department vehicles. Crash Investigators also provide expertise to patrol officers regarding the investigation of less serious crashes. Many of these investigations involve the determination of speed, crash reconstruction, interviewing witnesses, collecting and preserving forensic evidence and court testimony.

Child Seat Technicians


