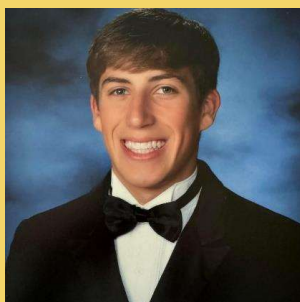


YOUTH ADVISORY COUNCIL

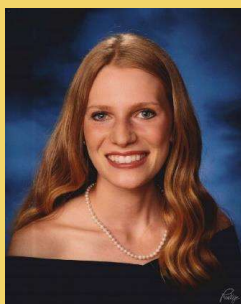

Chesterfield-Colonial Heights CHILDREN'S SERVICE ACT

The Children's Services Act (CSA) is a law enacted in 1993 that established a single state pool of funds to support services for eligible youth and their families. State funds, combined with local community funds, are managed by local interagency teams who plan and oversee services to youth. Eligibility and services are determined through the local Family and Assessment Planning Team and funding is coordinated through the local Community and Policy Management Team. Youth and families are referred through Colonial Heights Public Schools, District 19 CSB, Dept. of Social Services, 12th District Juvenile Court, or parent.

In FY 2024, 52 youth and their families received community-based services, therapeutic foster care, respite services, day school programs, residential treatment (in-patient), out-patient services (mental health and substance abuse).

Of those 52, 29 (56%) were referred from Colonial Heights Public Schools; and 23 (44% were referred from the Department of Social Services).

JUVENILE & DOMESTIC VIOLENCE TASKFORCE

The Colonial Heights Juvenile and Domestic Violence Task Forces works to create and develop an alliance designed to coordinate agencies and community efforts to respond to juvenile and domestic violence.

In FY24, the Juvenile & Domestic Task Force hosted the first annual “No Excuse for Abuse” event. This event took place in the month of April, which is recognized for “National Child Abuse Prevention”. At this event, there were vendors that provided information and resources for youth, adults, and families, mental and physical health, domestic violence shelters, and crisis stabilization. Participants walked together to show support in ending violence while carrying signs. This event brought in over 100 people from the community.

CADRE/IMPACT COALITION

Office on Youth partners with Colonial Heights High School to offer youth an opportunity to raise awareness for the prevention of the use of alcohol, drugs, and other substances by youth. Youth learn leadership skills needed to address common issues among youth. The club is led by adult advisors from CHHS and the Office on Youth. Club meetings take place after school as scheduled. Youth plan and lead events throughout the school year such as Red Ribbon Week, Project Sticker Shock and YADAPP. In FY24, youth chose “Choose to Refuse” as their theme. During Red Ribbon week, wristbands with the “**Choose to Refuse**” message were given out. Members asked classmates to join in standing against drug use by signing a pledge poster

CHILD ABUSE AWARENESS & PREVENTION



April is recognized as Child Abuse Prevention month. Becca Lynch accepted a proclamation from City Council on behalf of Office on Youth. MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS

May is recognized nationally as Mental Health Awareness month providing an opportunity to raise awareness, combat stigma, and promote mental health resources. Experiencing mental health issues can make it challenging to live everyday life and maintain recovery. Beyond the individual, these challenges ripple out through our families, our communities, and our world.

Becca Lynch accepted a proclamation from City Council on behalf of Office on Youth.

1 in 6 U.S. youth aged 6-17 experience a mental health disorder each year

50% of all lifetime mental illness begins by age 14, and 75% by age 24

Suicide is the 2nd leading cause of death among people aged 10-14



KIDS' ACHIEVING PROGRESS AFTERSCHOOL

The Kids' Achieving Progress is a referral-based afterschool program for youth in 3rd-6th grades. The program promotes academic improvement, positive behavior, self-esteem and physical fitness. Youth meet after school with mentors who support these goals through learning activities, team building and academic support.

In FY2024, 35 youth were enrolled from Lakeview, Tussing, and North Elementary. 75% showed overall improvement with grades. 49% of referrals based on academic need, 37% of referrals were based on social-emotional need and 14% of referrals were based on behavioral needs. Some participants were referred for multiple reasons.

SUMMER LEADERSHIP PROGRAM

Each year, Office on Youth plans and implements a leadership program for rising 6th and 7th grade students. This two-week program teaches youth about being leaders in their school and community. Speakers throughout the two weeks reinforce the idea of responsibility, accountability, and leadership through experiential activities and field trips. In FY 2024, youth visited the fire station, police department, and courthouse. They enjoyed talks with the Mayor and the City Manager. The program ended with a Lemonade Stand in the City Hall parking lot. Youth created posters, prepared lemonade and asked for donations. They raised \$600 and all funds were given to the Colonial Heights Animal Shelter.

YOUTH CONSERVATION CORPS

Office on Youth partners each year with the Chesterfield Adolescent Resource Program to give teens an opportunity to work alongside conservation staff at Pocahontas State Park. Fifteen youth are selected each summer for the three-week education and service program. The program is designed to encourage positive youth development. Teens learn the principles of natural resource stewardship and the importance of sustaining Virginia's unique natural environment. YCC was established to heighten respect for the environment, increase stewardship of public lands and foster teamwork, self-esteem, improved citizenship and social responsibility. Office on Youth receives a yearly grant from the Department of Conservation and Recreation which allows each teen to receive a stipend when the program is complete.



Work, Learn, Play, Grow

PREVENTION AND DIVERSION PROGRAMS

Community-based programs funded by state and local government to divert youth from the courts, and provide sanctions, education, and services. Programs are funded through the City of Colonial Heights and the Virginia Community Crime Control Act grant.

Assessments

Contract with District 19 to provide substance abuse assessments to youth referred by the 12th District Court. FY 2024, 10 youth completed assessments.

Community Service-Learning Program

Court ordered program for youth to complete community service hours. In FY 2024, 24 youth completed 405 hours.

Shoplifting Diversion Program

Court ordered program to educate youth and parents about shoplifting, the laws, and the impact on the community. In FY 2024, 98 youth completed the program.

ATOD

Court ordered program to educate youth and parents about the risks associated with alcohol, tobacco and drug use. In FY 2024, 3 youth completed the program.



Botvin Life Skills Middle School

Prevention program for youth to develop personal self-management skills, general social skills and build effective defenses against pressures to use tobacco alcohol, and other drugs. In FY 2024, 417 (6th-7th grade) youth completed the program at CHMS.



Tackling Tough Skills

Prevention program for youth to develop strategies for healthy decision-making, build healthy relationships, and learn the consequences of substance use and risk-taking. In FY 2024, 38 youth at the Community Day School completed the program.
